	the screen, along with a legend which can be customized to suite our	
	needs (different colors and intervals). We can pick up various states to	
	compare, either by clicking on the map or the table. You can also

compare to the HealthyPeople 2020 target. The legends and markings are set based on the final year of the data. They will provide each single year of the reports so there is a map for each year. There is also a dashboard that compares data to HealthyPeople 2020 goals.

CDC is hoping to launch data by age by the end of this week as well as by race/ethnicity by the end of this month (April). CDC is also planning on doing a soft launch, along with an awardee message when these are ready to be posted.

CDC is working with CMS to launch pneumococcal vaccination coverage in nursing homes. You will be able to choose data by individual state. The CDC is also working with PRAMS on Tdap data by stage of pregnancy for states that collect this data; this data is older – from 2011. This is a workin-progress and isn't ready yet.

#### **Questions for Stacie:**

- Where did the data come from?
   Answer: The behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System. The CDC will have a "help and user guide" at the top of the page with a link to the MMWR which shows the methods and limitations. BRFSS questions are on a 3-year cycle; some states have asked the questions more frequently and they have those data available.
- 2. What else will be rolled out in the future months? Answer: They hope to have BRFSS general population by age and race/ethnicity, nursing home data from Minimum Data Set (extremely rich data), and PRAMS data. They have SchoolVaxView posted already; this will be migrated over to new software and new antigens will be added and exemption data will stay. The newer things that will be added (late Spring/early Summer) is TeenVaxView with NIS-Teen data. This will have general information, publications, information on objectives and targets with teen data from 2007 to 2014; this will be made into interactive maps. As soon as possible after TeenVaxView they will have ChildVaxView which will go back to the start of the NIS. Around August 26 when NIS-Teen comes out, they expect TeenVaxView to be launched. By the end of November, they will be launching the newer version of FluVaxView using updated software. In October, ChildVaxView and SchoolVaxView will be updated. The software has the possibility to write written reports (state profiles) in the long-term. This will allow states the ability to download a state report with written descriptions of data (now only available to project officers – would be made available online). There is a possibility to run a dual report to compare your state to other states, along with a comparison of how your state
